




Do you believe your organization has access to and uses the right data to drive optimal decision making for the supply chain?

What is the one piece of data that your organization doesn't have and you believe would have a positive impact on your ability to improve the healthcare supply chain?

- 17 respondents (35%) indicated we need visibility into predictive demand signals such as patient scheduling, medical records, actual product usage, and payor data
- 14 respondents (30%) indicated we need data that creates more transparency across the supply chain to include inventory levels (both supplier and provider), raw materials availability, product location, manufacturing location, and better information on backorder status
- Additional responses included:
 - Data standards UDI/UNSPC
 - Outcomes data
 - Product quality ratings
 - Clinical equivalency
 - Device registry
 - Information of the impact of the Strategic National Stockpile on inventory availabilty
